

Hibernians meet Ballymurphy families

Saying they were there "to pledge American support for Ballymurphy in its battle for truth and justice," National AOH Vice President Danny O'Connell and National Secretary Jere Cole met Ballymurphy Massacre families on September 23rd. The AOH officers were escorted by victims' family members to the murder scenes and given a moving account of each killing. The fact-finding visit was also attended by Relatives for Justice.

They begin at the spot where Father Hugh Mullan was shot as he waved a white handkerchief. Here Liam and Pat Quinn, then told how their brother Frank Quinn was killed as he tried to help Fr. Mullan and the wounded Bobby Clarke.

They next went to the spot families where four of the Ballymurphy victims were shot, including Joan Connolly and Danny Teggart. John Teggart described how his father was shot 14 times with high velocity rifles, while Joan Connolly's daughter Philomena described how her mother was shot and left to bleed to death without medical attention.

John Laverty's sisters Carmel Quinn and Rita Bonar pointed out where their brother was killed along with Joseph Corr. Another brother, Terry, was stopped, and tortured."

They ended at the spot where Eddie Doherty was killed. There Eddie's sister Kathleen explained how he was shot in the back.

John Teggart concluded: "The British whitewashed these murders with claims of gun battles and troops under fire. There was

no gun battle, no bullets or guns found, no troopers wounded. Our loved ones were murdered, they were shot in the back".

Andree Murphy, Deputy Director of Relatives for Justice said: "The voices of the families today, as we visited the sites where the 11 were killed, gave eloquent testimony to the horror of the killings, the absolute impunity from which the soldiers who took those lives benefitted, and most poignantly the impact that these killings had

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An Gorta Mor film an opportunity for Hibernian Charity

The harvest season is upon us, and Joe Norton, National Chairman for Missions and Charities, was able to gather in a partnership with IFC Films for theatre showings of the cinematic portrayal of An Gorta Mor, in the film **Black 47**.

Black 47 is a film about one man's revenge for the horrors brought upon his family during An Gorta Mor. The partnership enables local divisions to set up stations for food donations, fundraising and information sharing on Hibernian Charities and AOH membership.

Contact was made with IFC after several exchanges with grass roots marketers by the Archbishop Donoghue Division in Atlanta. Brother Norton outlined in an email to IFC Films contacts that the AOH and its charitable arm, Hibernian Charities, have a deep-seated interest in providing financial support for the pursuit and spread of Irish History and the end of hunger — two subjects at the core of Black 47.

Shannon Balstad, IFC Films' coordinator for Marketing & Publicity, contacted Dr. Joe, and shared benefits and interests were quickly identified. The size of our organization would help drive traffic to the film and we would be able to set up donation and information sharing stations in theaters.

With the effects of Hurricane Florence rapidly depleting local food pantries in the coastal Carolinas, food donations became a focus. Ms. Balstad offered to help local divisions by customizing marketing materials, getting food bins and coordinating group sales for interested divisions. Contacts were also shared to allow interested divisions opportunities to sponsor private screenings.

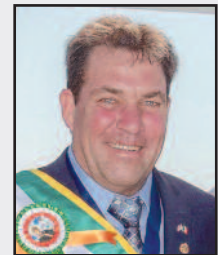

While they were watching the Republic of Ireland soccer team play a World Cup game in New Jersey, six patrons of a bar in that area were gunned down by Loyalist killers, members of the UVF. The documentary that the journalists worked on surrounding that incident, entitled, "No Stone Unturned," has been available on Prime Video for some time now. All Brothers are urged to view, as it gives great insight into the problems in conducting a serious investigation involving Loyalist crimes in the North of Ireland.

We have already started our Freedom For All Ireland campaign to raise money for worthy Irish causes and the ultimate goal of the peaceful reunification of the 36 Counties. Our new chairman, Martin Galvin, has already hit the ground running and appointed a competent committee to help him in this endeavor. When you attend your Division meetings, please remind your Brothers that all our members should participate in this very worthy cause and be charitable as usual.

As we get ready to enter the Christmas season, please do not forget to prepare ourselves spiritually from this material world and remind our families and ourselves what the birth of our Savior is all about.

This mutually beneficial program will enable:

- The National Board to generate a new revenue stream to offset the loss of the recent U.S. Bank card rewards program.
- Provide members who own businesses and offer services an economical means to advertise to the membership.
- Provide trusted referrals to members and their families who are looking for professional services or businesses to support.

Recently, I had major home renovations done to my house and completed an in depth bid process by six contractors. It got me thinking I wish I knew of any local AOH members who may also offer these services. This new program will give our members that opportunity whether you are looking for services for HVAC, painting, landscaping, lawyers, accountants, dentists, doctors or funeral directors. Or maybe you are traveling and would like to support an AOH owned pub, restaurant or hotel.

The owners of these businesses will be offered the opportunity to list their business/service address, phone and email contact information and their website. Advertisers can create Hibernian-specific landing pages to offer Hibernian discounts.

New procedures

As I indicated last issue in keeping with my promise to completely modernize procedures for a smoother operation in this electronic age, we are making some significant changes this year in the way we update rosters. Beginning in the second half of October, **your Financial Secretary will be receiving via email a PDF of your roster. As of that date, 10/15/2018, WE WILL STOP SENDING 2018 CARDS, and it will not be necessary to submit Form 40s. Simply make changes to your roster.**

As of this writing, **40** divisions STILL do not have an email on file for their Financial Secretary. If your financial secretary does not have an email address, the roster will be sent to the division President. If neither has an email you will not receive a roster until we can communicate via email.

Let me remind you that the Form 40 remains the PRIMARY vehicle to communicate individual changes. So, if you submitted a Form 9 with new officers this past year and indicated an email for an individual that may not have been captured unless you also sent a Form 40. If in doubt, please instruct your financial secretary to communicate with my office to rectify.

Once your roster is received, download the roster and print it out. You then may edit, and scan to email back to the National Secretary's office at jcole4838@gmail.com, with the notation "**Roster Changes**" in the subject line of the email. Alternatively, if you are comfortable and able, you may annotate the PDF, save, and email it back. Also new this year, should you maintain your records in an Excel spreadsheet you may make the changes there and email that back to the National Secretary's office. **Be mindful however that you need to supply ALL the information requested and CLEARLY indicate which records have changed on the spreadsheet.**

Please complete as soon as possible as that roster will be used to calculate your per capita due from 2018. Per Capita is paid on the total members as of 12/31/2018. The per capita payment is still only \$12 for 2018.

Lastly, and least preferred, you may mail a hard copy to the National Secretary Office as you have in previous years. As always if you make changes by hand we ask that you try to write the information as neatly as possible.

If you have not received a roster by Thanksgiving — something is wrong. Please contact the National Secretary's office and we will make alternative arrangements.

These changes to procedure will require that you use **THE NEW forms – 40, 9 and 11 – please be sure to destroy ALL forms you have on hand** and only use the new ones that you may download from our website: www.AOH.com, (under Forms).

Beginning in January 2019 we will begin sending the 2019 membership cards. The cards will be based on the best information we have available whether of not you have returned a roster, perhaps triggering additional changes.

Concomitantly, this fall we are phasing in a completely new procedure that will permit your financial secretary to change and update your division roster directly. This will be accomplished by the financial secretary securely logging in via a portal on our website to a copy of your division roster. Change will be entered directly by him. After the changes have been reviewed, they will be permanent. Your financial secretary will be able to also print a copy of your most current roster. Membership cards will continue to be issued from my office.

This new system should be operational for all shortly after the beginning of 2019 and you will be updated frequently. A training guide will be published to lead your financial secretary through the entire process.

I realize this is a big step for many of you but it is necessary if we are to streamline our recordkeeping.

Thank you for your cooperation.

Retention: You got them, now keep them

The movie "Black 47" sheds light on the history of our ancestors that were starved and who emigrated by the millions during the Famine years, as the British washed their hands with some exceptions. This film portrays the consequences of the greatest disaster of the 19th Century, An Gorta Mor. The movie showed some of the hatred and viciousness of what happened to our relatives. The film makes clear that there were tons of food being exported to Britain daily while Ireland starved. There were also the soup kitchens, in which many of them demanded the starving family convert to Protestantism before they would be fed.

Our 90-year-old Hibernian brother John W. "Bill" Fahey, from Division 5, Suffolk County, NY, has worked tirelessly for many years to convince the Vatican to beatify "the Irish Hunger Martyrs." He is leading this petition to beatify the victims of the Irish Hunger, by making the point that they died for their faith. He has worked with the Committee for the Commemoration of Irish Famine Victims (CCIFV), an Ireland-based organization, to dedicate and plant memorials in the United States and Ireland to identify the often-unmarked graves of thousands of Irish famine victims. In Ireland a national commemoration day for the Irish Famine is reportedly set to be held on the third weekend in May every year starting in 2019. To date, more than 28,000 people have submitted their names in support of his request for beatification of the martyrs. If you would like to add your name to his petition his website provides a way for you to have your voice heard.

Now is a good time to start making plans on how your division will remember An Gorta Mor during the third Weekend in May 2019.

I had the privilege of viewing the film by Maurice Fitzpatrick "In the Name of Peace: John Hume in America." If you have a chance to watch it you'll come away with a greater understanding of the Peace Process and the tireless efforts that John Hume spent to get to the 1998 Peace Agreement. In the film, Hume came to the United States because there was nowhere else to go. The Irish government was beginning to exert pressure on the British government to create a lasting solution. But put crudely, Britain was very reluctant to challenge the unionist veto that had brought Northern Ireland to the brink of civil war. The only place from where that pressure could come was from the U.S.

In the words of Hume: "Ireland is not a romantic dream; it is not a flag; it is 4.5 million people divided into two powerful traditions. The solution will be found not on the basis of victory for either, but on the basis of agreement and a partnership between both. The real division of Ireland is not a line drawn on the map but in the minds and hearts of its people."

McGuinness Principles adopted by first major city

On September 25, the Yonkers, NY, became the first major city to unanimously adopt the McGuinness Principles. The impetus came from Myles Scully Division 1, Westchester, and its President, Kevin Ellis. The City Council meeting was attended by officers and members from National, New York State and all of Westchester County's divisions, as well as LAOH members, officers of the United Irish Counties, Hudson Valley Irish Center, Police Emerald Society of Westchester County, and many Yonkers residents. National Director Dan Dennehy and Division 1 Past President Bob Stauff testified on behalf of the McGuinness Principles.

Dennehy testified that as a proud son of Yonkers, he recognized that the City of Yonkers has long embraced the rights of all citizens, including its large Irish American community. The McGuinness Principles seek the same for all in Ireland, by instilling a Bill of Rights, language equality, justice on legacy crimes and self-determination through a referendum on Irish Unity. Bob Stauff then testified that Yonkers was the first City Council to adopt the MacBride Principles and had issued the first proclamation that Gerry Adams received during his first visit to the U.S. Stauff thanked Councilman John Rubbo for proposing the resolution and Councilman Mike Breen and Council President Mike Khader for their enthusiastic support.

Councilman Rubbo remarked that 20 years ago the Good Friday Agreement was ratified by more than 70 percent of the voters in the North of Ireland, yet much needs to be done so that Martin McGuinness' legacy may be fulfilled. He also recognized the AOH for keeping the issues of Ireland on their agenda. City Council President Khader said that he studied the McGuinness Principles and the need for these principles is not unique to the North of Ireland. Truth, fairness, and an even playing field are principles we should all live by regardless of race, religion, color, creed or political party, and that is why he proudly supported the resolution. The McGuinness Principles were then adopted with a vote of 7-0.

Historical Happenings

In October, Mount Olivet cemetery will see a host of Hibernian dignitaries and members of the general public at the dedication of a granite name block at the recently repaired tombstone of Thomas Devin Reilly, Irish revolutionary, Young Irelander and journalist. In 1800s Ireland, Reilly wrote for *The Nation* and *The Irish Felon* in support of Irish tenants. As a member of the Irish Confederation during the Great Hunger, he urged tenants to refuse to pay rents, retain crops to feed their own families and destroy bridges and railway lines to prevent the removal of food from the country. He was involved in the failed Young Irelander Rising of 1848 and fled to America where he became active in U.S. politics in support of Irish independence and secured a job in the U.S. Land Office. James Connolly later claimed him as a pioneer of American labor journalism. When he died, an article in the 7 March 1854 NY Times noted: "In Mr. Reilly's early demise, the Irish cause has lost an able soldier and the aid of a brilliant intellect."

The original marble stone above Reilly's grave was eroded by weather and acid rain to the point where the inscription was barely visible and the Celtic Cross had been broken off the top. Beltway Bulldog Jack O'Brien assembled the usual suspects: Keith Carney, Ralph Day, D.C. State Board President J.P. Walsh and a host of Hibernians to Remember Reilly, and the project was underway. The result is the repaired cross and a granite block replicating the original inscription from the worn tombstone that reads: "On Decoration (Memorial) Day, 1881, Clan na Gael erected this cross in memory of Irish patriot Thomas Devin Reilly, died March 5, 1854 at age 30. May God have mercy on his soul, amen." On the base is carved, "A soul has come into Ireland." Other inscriptions include "Jeannie and little Molly, child of Jennie and Thomas Devin Reilly." The block has a harp at the top and shamrock wreaths on either side and the bottom is inscribed, "District of Columbia Ancient Order of Hibernians - 2018" Congratulations to our brothers and their supporters for keeping the tradition alive.



If you will recall, back in the December/January issue of this Digest, I wrote of the magnificent Great Hunger Memorial in Providence, Rhode Island. I had been invited by AOH Brothers Bob Deignan and Ed Johnson to perform, with John Corr, as The Bard and The Busker, at their Tenth Anniversary fundraiser for the monument. That was when I first saw what had been a million dollar project dedicated to telling the story of the Great Hunger and dedicated to the memory of its victims. It was so much more than I'd expected and I highly recommended it as a place to visit. I just received an email from Brother Deignan notifying me that in mid-August of this year, that incredible Memorial, which I admired so much, had been the victim of serious vandalism and major theft. Four of the 11 bronze plaques, containing the story of the tragedy and mounted on the Narrative Historical Wall, have been stolen! Personally I can't help feeling it is as if someone had stolen the tombstone of a relative! The seven remaining plaques have been removed for safekeeping. The monetary value of the stolen plaques on the scrap-metal black market is fairly small, but the cost of repairing the damage to our common heritage by replacing and better securing all of them will be very high. Brother Deignan and the Hunger Committee are determined to repair the damage so that future visitors will know the truth of that terrible time in Irish history. They have launched an appeal to the nation-wide Irish community to assist them in the restoration. Echoes From Irish History

An American Hero From Ireland

In 2009, Matthew Carroll, a U.S. Viet Nam veteran and Purple Heart recipient, proposed a memorial in Ireland to recognize more than 2,500 Irish nationals who served with the U.S. military in Southeast Asia during the Viet Nam conflict. Carroll presented his plan to the Ennis, Co. Clare council. The memorial would include the names of 29 Irish men and one Irish woman who lost their lives, and the inscription: "This memorial is dedicated to the Irish men and Irish women who served with allied forces in Southeast Asia during the period 1964 through 1975." Ennis authorities supported the idea and provided a place for the memorial, but funding became an issue. In an attempt to find funding, Carroll contacted Bill Halpin, also a Viet Nam veteran and member of the AOH VA State Board. The VA State Board endorsed the project and Halpin invited Carroll to the 2014 AOH National Convention in St Louis to solicit support for the project. However, the required funding was not realized as other commitments had already been made and the project went dormant.

In January 2015, another Irish citizen and Viet Nam veteran, LTC John Dullahan (U.S. Army, retired), learned of the project and with Carroll's approval took over lead on the project. Under Dullahan's leadership a more modest memorial was designed, funding was achieved and on Veteran's Day, November 11, 2016, the memorial was dedicated. The 30 names were solemnly read by Dullahan, Carroll, Halpin and others, taps was played by an American Legion bugler and speeches were made by the U.S. Defense Attaché, the Ennis mayor, the Commander of the Killarney American Legion Post and the Irish Defense Force, among other officials. The monument stands in Monastery Park, Ennis and below the names are the words, "We express our heartfelt gratitude for the service and sacrifice of those above and to their families, loved ones and the Irish nation."

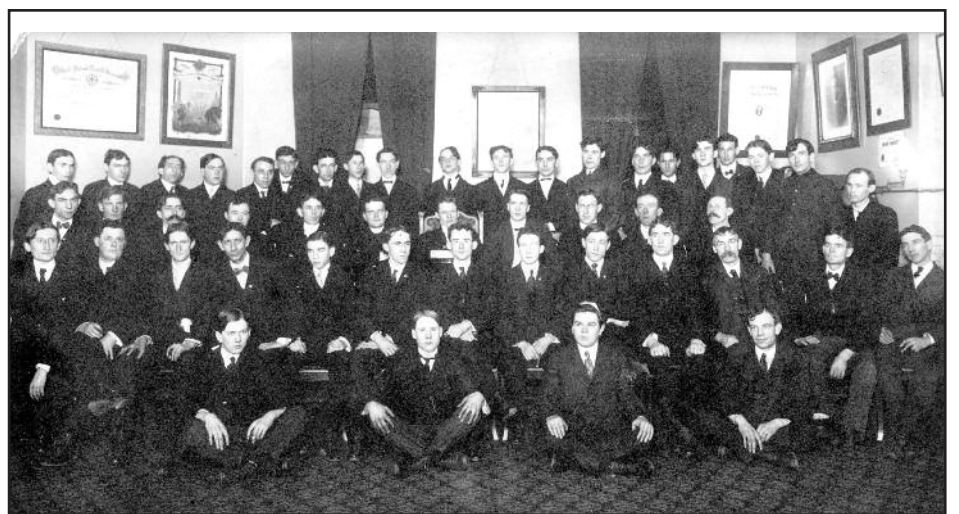
But that's not the end of the story! One of the names on the memorial is U.S. Marine Corps Lance Corporal and Navy Cross recipient Patrick Gallagher. Gallagher, from Ballyhaunis, Co. Mayo, lived in Lynbrook, Long Island N.Y. before serving in Viet Nam. He was awarded the Navy Cross for his actions in July 1966, when he threw himself on an incoming grenade, shielding his fellow Marines and quickly pitched it into a nearby river where it exploded out of harm's way, saving himself and others. Gallagher was killed in action a year later just days before his enlistment was up; he was 23 years of age.

On March 13, 2018, U.S. Secretary of the Navy Richard V. Spencer announced that the Navy's next guided-missile destroyer would be named the USS Gallagher in his honor. "Lance Corporal Gallagher is an American hero," Spencer said, "His exemplary service in defense of our nation and his strength and sacrifice leaves an example for all servicemen and women to emulate. His legacy will live on in the future USS Gallagher and his heroic actions will continue to inspire future Sailors and Marines." His legacy will also live on in a monument in Ennis, Co. Clare.

immigration

I ask that each Division and State to comply with our Constitution and appoint an Immigration Chair. This chair is a resource on promoting fair and equitable immigration between Ireland and the U.S. and providing members with background on current Irish and U.S. immigration policies, issues and concerns.

It's very easy for Irish citizens to visit here for up to 90 days and for U.S. citizens to visit Ireland for the same amount of time. But what about staying longer? Or living, studying or working here or there? That's when visas come into play and in both cases, it's not easy!

The regulations to receive a visa to Ireland or the U.S. can be complicated, and those considering staying longer than 90 days need to learn all they can before they travel.

Irish people coming to the U.S. can contact the Irish Immigration Centers here. Similarly, an excellent organization is available in Ireland. To learn more about migrating to Ireland, please visit Cross Care: Migrant Project here: <https://www.migrantproject.ie>

Irish citizens need apply!

The 2020 Diversity Visa Lottery is open from 3 October 2018.

The DV Lottery is a green card visa lottery of 55,000 visas for the United States available annually. A computer-generated, random lottery drawing chooses the successful candidates for visas.

Although the Irish only get a handful of the 55,000 DV visas, it's still worth applying!

This is basically the only way to get a green card by lottery, and each person can apply only once. You must apply online, and there is no cost, it is free to enter, and if successful, entrants have the chance to apply for a 'Green Card' or permanent resident visa – which allows you to live and work in the U.S. as a legal permanent resident.

The AOH National Immigration Committee is focused on these issues and are ready to get to work with you, our members, when the time is right.

I would like to commend President Ben Coleman and his Lincoln, Nebraska, AOH Division for hosting an Irish Hooley to welcome immigrants. FFAI plans Ballymurphy campaign

Before meeting the victims' families in Belfast, National Vice President Danny O'Connell, along with National Secretary Jere Cole, called the upcoming Ballymurphy Massacre inquest "a fundamental test of Britain's ability to give legacy justice."

The families contend that after internment raids ended on August 9th, 1971, British paratroopers opened fire without warning. Ten innocent people, including a Catholic priest, Fr. Hugh Mullan, waving a white handkerchief, and a mother of eight children, Joan Connolly, were shot dead. An 11th murder victim, Paddy McCarthy, died of a heart attack when troopers placed an empty gun inside his mouth in mock execution.

British Royal Military Police then made their troopers innocent and the dead guilty. The British did it again five months later, with too many witnesses on Bloody Sunday. Forty-seven years later the Ballymurphy families will get their chance to put Britain's claims on trial at a court inquest.

Our national officers stood shoulder to shoulder with them, behind the Ballymurphy Massacre Campaign banner, and pledged AOH support in their battle for truth.

We will keep that pledge with a speaking tour, inquest updates and a congressional initiative. Last January, Mark Thompson, of Relatives for Justice, conducted a weeklong emergency American speaking tour, which inspired a congressional initiative, five public events and formal proclamations of support by state and local governments.

Beginning in Philadelphia on November 11, FFAI will sponsor a five-state tour in which Carmel Quinn of the Ballymurphy Massacre families will give AOH members an up-to-the-minute report on the inquest. We will then provide reports on the testimony.

Congressional call to action

Last April, 16 members of Congress joined a breakthrough bipartisan letter sponsored by the AOH to the British ambassador about legacy truth. We got 16 signatures, because AOH members called or visited local congressional offices until they signed.

Both the British ambassador and colonial British secretary, Karen Bradley, had to reply. Britain pays attention when American congressmen and senators are watching.

FFAI is calling on AOH members across the country to contact your local senators and congressional representatives, and ask them if they will make time to hear Carmel Quinn in Washington D.C. on November 14 or 15.

Appeal

Today, Britain still denies truth and justice to the families of victims murdered by the crown or loyalist agents in places like Ballymurphy or Loughinisland. Brexit threatens catastrophe across Ireland. They even refuse an Irish Language Act. Instead of opening the door to Irish national freedom, Britain and the DUP want to nail that door shut. America can make a difference, but only if the AOH and LAOH, as the voice of the Irish in America, lead the way. Our donations to carefully chosen charities through monies raised by the FFAI Annual Christmas Appeal, along with our political and educational campaigns, are the cornerstone of our FFAI initiative.

This year, our national officers have begun new FFAI education and information programs about British injustices in the six counties. They are implementing many of your suggestions to enhance the Appeal. Our national officers are asking for a commitment from everyone to participate and support FFAI with a donation or fundraising event. Please donate and help the AOH and LAOH make the difference. Help make freedom for all of Ireland not an aspiration or endeavor but the reality for those Irish people still denied it!

Irish American Heritage Month

It is a story worth telling, especially at this point in our nation's history. We have to ensure that our young people grow up with a feeling of pride in their heritage equal to the pride other young people are formally encouraged to feel in theirs. We have to challenge the reticence of our governmental and educational institutions in telling it and correct some selective amnesia. It all starts with asking a respectful why to our educational institutions; why Irish American Heritage Month is not celebrated on par with the resources put forth for other heritages.

Brothers, as I write this it appears that the Good Friday Agreement and the Peace it has wrought is in grave peril. The decision of the British people to pursue Brexit, which the people of Northern Ireland of all communities rejected by 56 percent, will occur in March 2019. As of the writing of this article in October there is still lack of agreement between the UK and the EU on how to smoothly transition the UK out of the EU. Any agreement between the UK and EU must go through the bureaucratic process of being approved by both the EU and the UK, implying that we are approaching the "point of no return" for Brexit now. Being that we are dealing with politicians, it is highly likely that there may be some device to stop or slow the clock, but given that they have made zero progress in two years there is little reason to hope that even an extra two months would enable a resolution. We are also seeing sentiments from the continental EU nations, who to their credit have been trying to support Ireland, that their patience with some of the nonsense coming out of Downing Street and Whitehall is at an end.

The UK crashing out of the EU will mean a repartitioning of Ireland behind a hard border of checkpoints and barbed wire not seen since the signing of the Good Friday Agreement (GFA). The UK has already suspended the sale of border police stations that prior to Brexit were considered surplus to demand. Since the GFA the border between the six counties and the Republic of Ireland has only been demarcated by the road signs switching from kilometers to miles and the absence of Irish. In the 20 years since the GFA, the ability to travel at will and at ease between Northern Ireland and the Republic has furthered community understanding and cemented the peace; Brexit will create not only physical but psychological borders.

While a hard Brexit will create construction jobs building a border, it comes at the price of the miraculous economic resurgence Northern Ireland has experienced since the Good Friday Agreement; overnight the construction cranes that currently dot the Belfast skyline could dry up as a white paper prepared by the British government projected that Northern Ireland could take a 12 percent hit to its GDP. The economy of the Republic will also be dramatically impacted as the United Kingdom, its largest trading partner, raises the drawbridge.

However, the greatest peril is the cause of peace. The Good Friday Agreement was created in the context of both the United Kingdom and the Republic of Ireland being members of the European Union committed to the free flow of people, capital and services between member nations. They were also bound by the European Commission on Human Rights, the avoidance of whose provision concerning justice for legacy issues has been cited by "Brexiters" as a key motivation for pursuing Brexit. The European Union is mentioned three times in this legally binding treaty, which the United Kingdom signed, implying that this historic document, facilitated by the United States, which ended three decades of violence, must now be amended. Anyone who follows Northern Ireland closely will know that when things in the North are taken apart there is a high probability they will never be put together again. See Stormont.

How is the United Kingdom reacting to this crisis in Northern Ireland? The current Northern Ireland Secretary admitted in an interview that she only recently realized that people who support Northern Ireland staying in the United Kingdom don't vote for parties that are dedicated to a reunified Ireland and vice versa. Little wonder that there has been little movement is restoring the power sharing government to Northern Ireland when Britain's point person on the ground is clueless as to why there is a need for power sharing. With a new border and immigration being a key Brexit issue the Immigration Minister admitted to never having read the Good Friday Agreement and its provision on citizenship. Most tellingly, the government of Theresa May is propped up by 10 seats of the DUP, the only major Northern Irish party not to sign the Good Friday Agreement, and whose opposition to "special status" allowing Northern Ireland to stay in the EU is the prime cause of the Brexit crisis. It is a toxic mix of ineptitude and cynicism.

Brothers, instead of completing the journey to peace that the Good Friday Agreement began 20 years ago, Brexit has stalled the peace process and threatens to send it into a tragic reverse. History shows that Britain only pays attention to Ireland when the U.S. signals it is watching. In turbulent times such as Brexit, it is imperative that we reaffirm our commitment to the people of Northern Ireland and are clear on our expectations. Those expectations are encapsulated in the McGuinness Principles; four basic principles, Equality, Respect, Truth and Self-Determination, that are the bedrock of any fair and just society.

To that end I need your help at every level of the Order to have your local and state government formally endorse the McGuinness Principles along with your elected congressional leaders. Templates for resolutions and talking points may be found on the AOH website. The McGuinness Principles reflect the core civil liberties that we as Americans take as givens; there should be no hesitancy on the part of any elected leader or government body to endorse them, but wide spread U.S. support will send a clear and unequivocal message that the peace and prosperity of the Good Friday Agreement and the welfare of the community of Ireland are important to the United States. Seeing wide spread U.S. endorsement of the McGuinness Principles sends a message that we remember the UK's Good Friday Agreement commitments and expect them to be honored; they are not to be sacrificed to Britain's self-centered Brexit aspirations.

Plans are beginning to be put into action to improve the value of information shared with our Hibernian veterans and the methods that will be used to get that information in front of you. As I wrote in the last Digest, I am reaching out to a group of veterans who attended the national convention break-out session who had expressed an interest in attending advisory committee meetings. In addition to those who were in the meeting and signed-up, there are a few veterans who have sent me information and reports in the past that I will reach out to as well to inquire about their interest in attending. If you have an interest in attending please drop me an email so we can discuss it. At future meetings we will plan to discuss:

1. Performing a review and upgrade/update of the AOH veterans website. We will have a separate small group discuss ideas with National Webmaster Jeff Nisler.
2. Discuss including some non-veteran Hibernians on the advisory committee. There are Hibernians who are not veterans themselves but have veterans in the family or in their Divisions and communities that they'd like to help. There are also non-veteran Hibernians who can provide great insights with history, medical issues, veterans courts, etc., and we can certainly use their help. More to come on this subject later.
3. Discuss an effective way to gather and distribute reports and information from/to Veterans Chairs and the general Hibernian veteran population.
4. Discuss ways to involve Hibernians nationally with projects such as wreath-laying and flag placing ceremonies, and other ceremonies that honor veterans – Hibernians or not.
5. Promote and publicize AOH Veterans Pin presentations.
6. Discuss the purpose and functions of the Veterans Municipal Courts. These courts exist in some, but not all, cities across the country, and brother Judge Pat Dugan is involved with them in Philadelphia. We are hoping that Pat can help with our understanding of the need for these courts and maybe how to promote their creation in communities without them.
7. I have obtained a name and email address list from the national office of all of the State Presidents and will be reaching out soon to try to obtain contact information for their Veterans Affairs chairmen in their states, or to encourage them to assign one if they have not already done so.

These are just a few ideas we've been kicking around over the summer and I look forward to working with the advisory team to put these projects in motion.

Lastly, I am grateful for the discussions, advice and ideas I've received from brother Danny Eakins, whom I've mentioned before as the one who conceptualized the veterans pin. Besides being a Hibernian, Danny's professional career is as an administrator with the Ohio Department of Veterans Services. As such, he brings a wealth of knowledge and experience to the table. I consider Danny an unofficial deputy of this committee and hope that he will be able to continue to provide great insights and leadership for us going forward.

In memoriam

Michael A. McNerney 1937 - 2018

Michael A. McNerney, 80, passed away on September 4, 2018. He was born in Niagara Falls, NY, on October 7, 1937, Mike was a graduate of Niagara Falls High School and Niagara County Community College. Mike served with the United States Air Force from 1955 until his honorable discharge in 1959.

On October 13, 1962, he was married to Barbara Stybak at Sacred Heart Church in Niagara Falls. Mike worked as an accountant at Hooker Chemical for many years. He was the former owner and operator of Power City Industrial Services and was a certified New York State Appraiser. In 2001, Mike and Barbara became the owners and operators of McNerney's Irish Imports, which they operated until his passing.

Mike was a member and past president of the Reverend James J. Browne Division 1, Niagara County, New York. Mike was elected to five terms as division president, serving longer than any other division member in history in that office. He also served as financial secretary and numerous other offices for the Niagara County Board, including president.

Mike was an effective ambassador for the division and advanced the cause of the AOH throughout Western New York. While at the helm of the division, he carried out his duties with wry humor and always deflected praise and attention from himself to others. Those who knew him best were always waiting for a joke or funny observation when those who didn't know him as well were initially being taken aback before becoming part of the swelling laughter. But he was an effective leader. An Irish raconteur.

On March 16, 2012, three years of meetings and planning culminated in the unveiling of the Fenian Memorial Marker on the Niagara River in Buffalo, NY. This was the site where the Fenians launched their raid into Canada in 1866. Mike was a member of the Fenian Marker Steering Committee and instrumental in creating this monument. As a permanent reminder of his role, Mike's name is etched on the memorial. He worked tirelessly with government officials and members of the Irish-American communities of Niagara and Erie counties, fostering positive relationships in the process.

In 2010, division members began assisting Heart and Soul Food Pantry by serving food to the needy and cleaning the facility. Mike was the catalyst for this expression of support for the less fortunate. He spent countless hours negotiating with officials over the contractual details of the annual Saint Patrick's Day celebration. He made arrangements for the bus ride and participation in the Buffalo Saint Patrick's Day Parade year after year. Mike increased the public's awareness of the Division's sponsorship of the Niagara Catholic High School scholarship by ensuring local media coverage. His hard work touched so many in so many ways.

In 2013, Mike was honored by being chosen the Grand Marshal of the Niagara Falls Saint Patrick's Day Parade. Current Division President Kevin O'Brien said, "No one deserved it more than our admirable and gracious brother Mike McNerney. His efforts benefited our Division and are clear expressions of Mike's devotion to Friendship, Unity and Christian Charity – the tenets of our Order. Mike McNerney set a standard for all of us to reach for. He will be missed and always warmly remembered."

Mike is survived by his wife of 55 years, Barbara (Stybak) McNerney; his daughter, Karen McNerney; and his son, Michael (Becca) McNerney. He is also survived by his grandchildren, Jessica, Mila and Callum McNerney; and his sister, Phyllis (Robert) Donovan. He was predeceased by his brother, Ronald McNerney.

September/October Awareness Month Designations

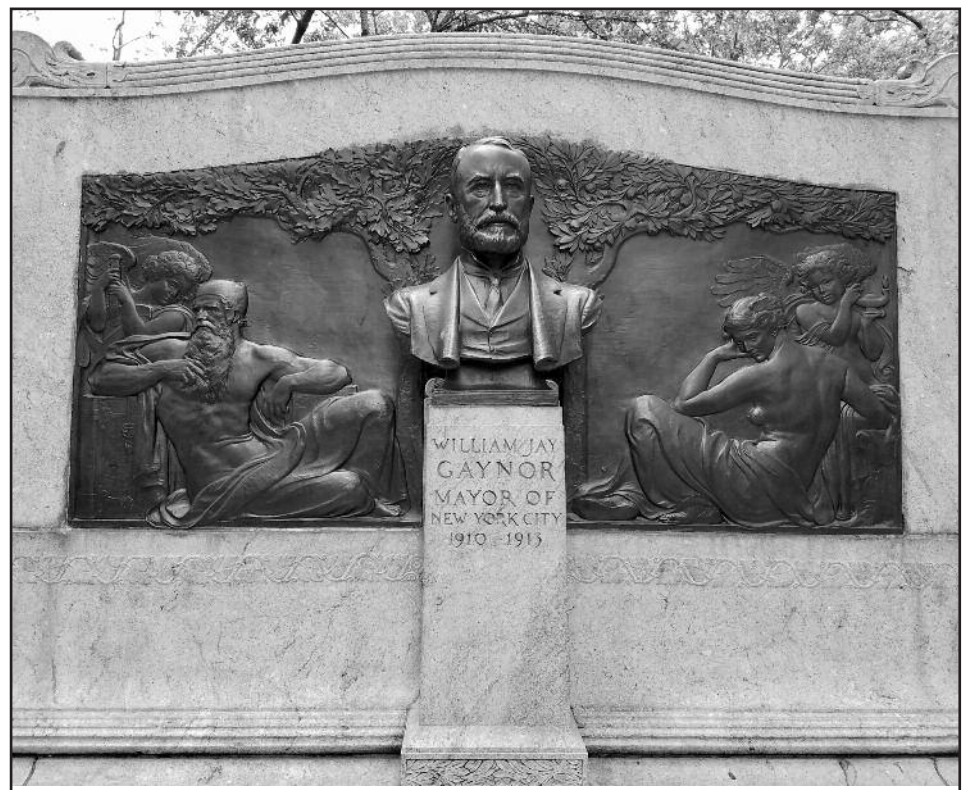

By honoring and working to promote any of these awareness campaigns, Hibernians help advocate an inclusive and consistent pro-life message that feeds our own soul while protecting others.

Agus duine an-suimiúil a bhí ann. And he was a very interesting person.*

But only frustration was in store for him as it was extremely difficult to set up honest government in NY back then.*

on the families in the years that followed and to this day”.

AOH National Vice-President Danny O’Connell said: “Both Jerry Cole and I have visited Ballymurphy before and were familiar with the events of the Massacre, but hearing the deep pain in the voices of these family members as they spoke of the murders of their loved ones, while standing in the very spots where these murders were committed, was deeply moving. The AOH, as a leading voice of the Irish in America, recognizes the upcoming Ballymurphy Massacre Inquest will be a fundamental test of Britain’s ability to give legacy justice.”

O’Connell continued by saying, “Today, we stood shoulder to shoulder behind the campaign banner with the Ballymurphy families, to pledge American support in their fight for justice and truth”.

“We will report what we saw and heard today,” O’Connell continued “back to our membership across the United States, and to our elected representatives. The AOH will follow this briefing by monitoring the Inquest, and providing updates on the testimony to our members. We will bring Carmel Quinn, a sister of one of the Ballymurphy Massacre victims, to America and bring Ballymurphy’s story directly to our members in a multi-state speaking tour in November. These families are entitled to truth about the killings of their loved ones. The AOH pledges to help them in their long battle to get that truth and justice.”

FFAI Chair Martin Galvin that “British colonial secretary Karen Bradley has already admitted she had no understanding how elections are fought in the north. The Ballymurphy Inquest may teach her she has no understanding of how British troops fought by shooting unarmed Irish civilians in the north”.

AOH leader praises choice of O’Dwyer as NYC parade grand marshal

As the President of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, I wish to congratulate our Brother Dr. Brian O’Dwyer, of AOH Division 3, New York County, on his selection as Grand Marshal to the New York City St. Patrick’s Day Parade. The New York City St. Patrick’s Day Parade is one of the largest parades in the world, and the Irish American Community of New York are to be commended for selecting a man whose stature as an Irish American stands equally as large.

Dr. O’Dwyer exemplifies the Hibernian tradition of defending the Irish Immigrant community; fulfilling our Oath to espouse the Irish community’s cause and aid them when in distress. Dr. O’Dwyer has been a tireless advocate for immigrants’ rights. He is a founder of the Emerald Isle Immigration Center, the largest Irish immigrant center in the United States. In its almost 25 years of existence, the center has helped literally thousands of Irish men and women as they immigrated to New York City. The center and Dr. O’Dwyer continues to be a focal point for the advocacy of Irish immigrant causes and continues the fight for a fair and just immigration policy for the Irish.

In keeping with his fellow Irish Americans, Dr. O’Dwyer has never forgotten his connection to the home of his ancestors. He has been an active proponent of the peace process; serving as a member of several U.S. Presidential delegations to Ireland and a White House advisor on the Northern Ireland Peace process. 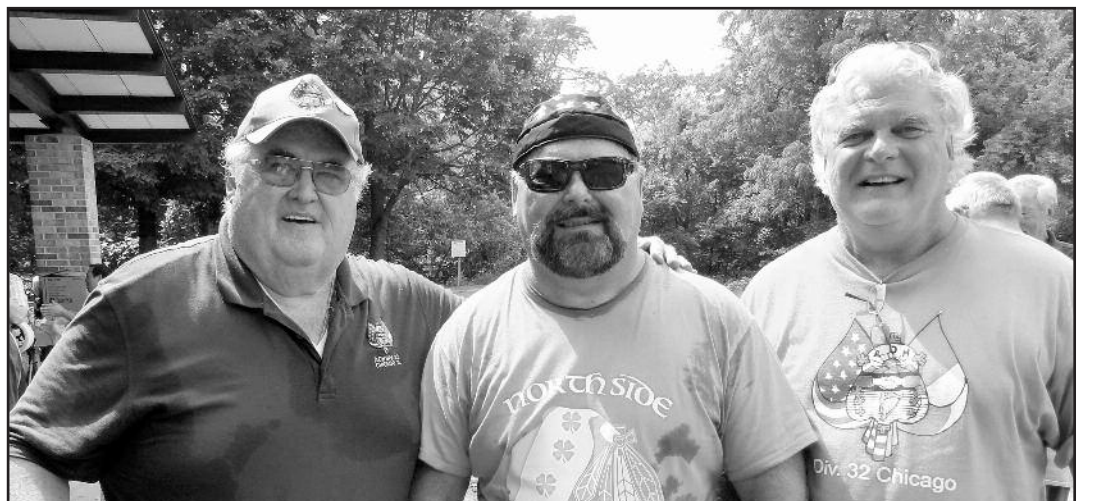

Kansas

Kansas AOH presents 'Irish Immigrants in Major League Baseball'

Hibernian Brother Seán Thomas Kane, of the Fr. Bernard Donnelly Division, gave an entertaining talk at the Kansas City Irish Fest over the Labor Day weekend. The presentation highlighted the 48 Irish immigrants who have played in Major League Baseball since the 1870s. Kane focused his lecture on some of the more colorful Irish-born players.

Ed Duffy, in 1871, became the first Irish immigrant to play professional baseball. Hugh Daily, one of the top professional pitchers of the 1880s, threw 483 strikeouts in one season, including 19 in one game. On the other side of baseball notoriety, Joe Cleary holds the record for the highest Earned Run Average for any pitcher. The Cork native in his one major league game recorded an ERA of 189.0. That was in 1945, and it was 67 years before the next Irish-born player was seen in another major league game.

Brother Kane discussed local Kansas City baseball history, including two of the city's pre-Royals' professional teams: the Kansas City Cowboys (1880s) and Kansas City Athletics (1955-1967). Local Irish baseball players Barney and Frank McLaughlin played for the Cowboys during the 1884 season. Currently, there is only one Irish-born professional player, Belfast native P.J. Conlon, who pitches for the New York Mets' AAA team, the Las Vegas 51s.

An Irish Cultural Tent is always part of the annual Kansas City Irish Fest, held at Crown Center in downtown Kansas City every Labor Day weekend. Sean has frequently contributed to these cultural workshops, making presentations on other aspects of Irish history and culture. Sean is earning his masters degree in history at the University of Missouri-Kansas City where he is studying the Renaissance and Early Modern European history.

Fitzgerald welcomed everyone in English to the Mass offered in Irish for "all those persecuted for their Catholic faith and Gaelic language." Woodlawn residents and Irish speakers, Division 5 Vice-President Ray Leyden, Aoife Farrell of Aisling and Mairead Greenan of Emerald Isle Immigration did the readings. Musician and Irish singer Dawn Doherty played and sang beautifully, while Daithi McLaughlin of the Brooklyn Gaelic Club assisted with the Irish hymns.

In his sermon, Fr. Fitzgerald said "The Catholic faith in Ireland, like the Irish language, had survived centuries of persecution and penal laws intended to wipe it out. Our ancestors had defied everything, attending outlawed Masses said by outlawed priests to keep their language and faith alive. We will survive the problems of today and come through stronger than ever."

Following the Gaelic Mass, Martin Galvin President of host Division 5 said: "We were overwhelmed by the help and encouragement we immediately got for Gaelic Mass Day. The parish, AOH statewide, local Irish community groups, Irish language clubs and musicians contacted us offering help. We have already been asked to have an Irish language Mass said annually and other AOH Divisions want to follow through on the idea originally suggested by Vic Vogel."

Galvin continued: "The Irish language is an important and indestructible part of our Irish heritage. We did not anticipate the deep appreciation, which even those like me who regrettably do not understand Irish would feel."

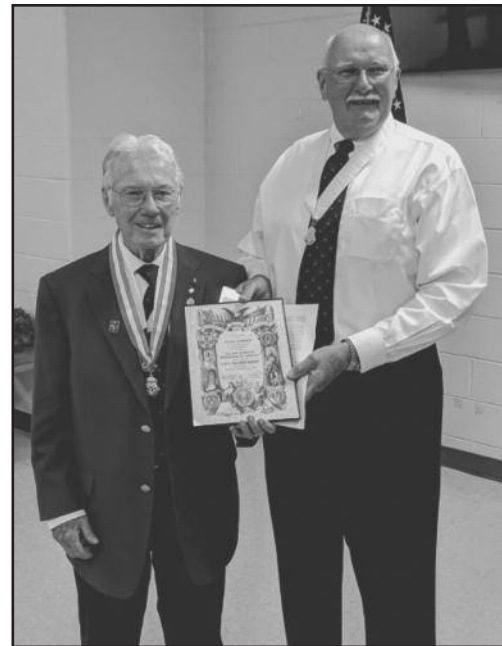
Scholarships awarded

He served three terms as division president and in several appointed positions including Historian, Charities Committee Chairman, Parish Liaison, and the Past Presidents Committee. In addition to climbing the ladder to state presidency, he served as the state's Buy Irish Chairman and currently holds the Political Education Chair.



Division Fights for Irish-American Heritage Landmark

Alexandria Division President Terry Riley is leading the fight to retain an important piece of Irish-American heritage. A park in the city has commonly been known as Fitzgerald Square, named after Revolutionary War hero and Irish immigrant Colonel John Fitzgerald. However, City Manager Mark Jinks initiated an effort to change the name to King Street Park. Some of cited reports that Fitzgerald owned slaves but one independent research found he did not own slaves. Jinks denies slavery as a decision factor.

Brother Riley has rallied support from several civic organizations, including The Ballyshaners, organizers of Alexandria's annual St Patrick Day Parades, and parishioners of the Basilica of St Mary, the first Catholic Church in Virginia and was founded by Fitzgerald in 1795. Further, Riley's petition to restore Fitzgerald's name has collected nearly 2,000 signatures. Signatories demanded the city council "immediately restore the name Fitzgerald Square to the waterfront project ... and emphasize the city's deep Irish past and current culture".



On September 12th more than 20 Hibernians, Ballyshaners, and other citizens squeezed into a small city hall conference room to attend the first public "naming committee" meeting. Riley pointed out "they're dismissing a war hero, a public servant, somebody wounded in battle, an immigrant and veteran."

The Kings County John T. Rogan Division 12 Boat Ride upon the River Rose out of Sheepshead Bay, Brooklyn, New York, was held on August 25.
